

HRSA's Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program

- Supports the [New Mexico Home Visiting Program](#) and provides voluntary, evidence-based home visiting programs for at-risk pregnant women and parents with young children up to kindergarten entry
- Builds upon decades of scientific research showing that home visits by a nurse, social worker, early childhood educator, or other trained professional during pregnancy and in the first years of a child's life helps prevent child abuse and neglect, supports positive parenting, improves maternal and child health, and promotes child development and school readiness

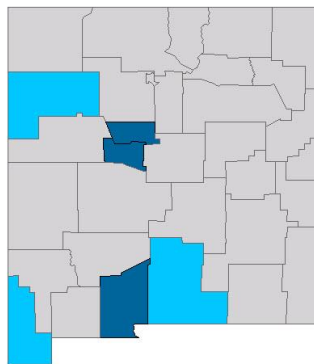
New Mexico MIECHV Program At-a-Glance

New Mexico Serves a High-Risk Population

MIECHV Program awardees serve high-risk populations. Awardees tailor their programs to serve populations of need within their state.

- 9.7% of households included pregnant teens
- 67.0% of households were low income
- 25.1% of households included someone with low student achievement

New Mexico Performance Highlights

- **Behavioral Concerns:** Caregivers were asked if they had any concerns regarding their child's development, behavior, or learning in 94.4% of postpartum home visits
- **Continuity of Insurance Coverage:** 81.7% of caregivers enrolled in home visiting had continuous health insurance coverage for at least 6 consecutive months
