

Mississippi Prioritizes Community Needs

MIECHV Program awardees tailor their programs to serve populations of need within their state. In Mississippi:

- 91.8% of households were at or below 100% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines
- 5.7% of households included a pregnant enrollee under age 21

Mississippi Performance Highlights

MIECHV Program awardees track and report improvements in MIECHV benchmark areas every year. Awardees are required by authorizing statute to demonstrate improvement in benchmark areas every three years. In the most recent assessment following FY 2020, the Mississippi MIECHV program successfully met the requirements for demonstration of improvement by improving in all 6 MIECHV benchmark areas.


FY 2022 Performance Highlights Include:

- **Depression Screening:** 97.7% of caregivers enrolled in home visiting were screened for depression within 3 months of enrollment or within 3 months of delivery. Research shows that postpartum depression can be associated with a number of adverse outcomes for both the mother and infant, such as poor parent-child bonding, negative parenting approaches, and increased risk of developmental, health, and safety concerns for the child.
- Community Partnership: To support family retention, Healthy Families Mississippi partnered with Amerigroup
 Managed Healthcare Providers to receive child safety supplies such as car/booster seats, outlet covers, baby
 monitors and child-proof cabinet locks for eligible families at the 15 local sites.
