


# HRSA's Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting (MIECHV) Program

supports the <u>Pennsylvania Home Visiting Program</u> and provides voluntary, evidence-based home visiting programs for expectant and new parents with children through kindergarten entry age living in communities that are at-risk for poor maternal and child health outcomes<sup>1</sup>.

## **Pennsylvania Prioritizes Community Needs**

MIECHV Program awardees tailor their programs to serve populations of need within their state. In Pennsylvania:

- **98.4**% of households were at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines and **66.1**% were at or below 100% of those guidelines.
- **6.9**% of households included a pregnant enrollee under age 21

## **Pennsylvania Performance Highlights**

MIECHV Program awardees track and report improvements in MIECHV benchmark areas every year. Awardees are required by authorizing statute to demonstrate improvement in benchmark areas every three years. In the most recent assessment following FY 2023, the Pennsylvania MIECHV program successfully met the requirements for demonstration of improvement by improving in all 6 <u>benchmark areas</u>.

#### FY 2023 Performance Highlights Include:


- **Domestic Violence Prevention**: The Pennsylvania MIECHV Program coordinated with the Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence to hold regional roundtables with domestic violence support providers and local implementing agencies. The sessions served as an opportunity to build meaningful robust relationships to increase support and safety for survivors of domestic violence.
- **Postpartum Care**: 85.3% of mothers enrolled in home visiting received a postpartum visit with a healthcare provider within 8 weeks of delivery. Many maternal deaths occur in the postpartum period and are considered preventable with appropriate follow-up care the CDC has found that 66 percent of postpartum deaths are preventable.




