

Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics (DBP) Training Program Fact Sheet

PROGRAM PURPOSE

The intent of the Developmental-Behavioral Pediatrics (DBP) Training Program is to train the next generation of leaders in developmental-behavioral pediatrics and build capacity to evaluate, diagnose or rule out, develop, and provide evidence-based interventions to individuals with autism spectrum disorders (ASD) and other developmental disabilities (DD).

The MCHB DBP Training Program is concerned with the broad range of behavioral, psychosocial, and developmental issues that present in primary care pediatric practice.

This is accomplished through:

- Supporting fellows in developmental-behavioral pediatrics by preparing them for leadership roles as teachers, investigators, and clinicians advancing the field of developmental-behavioral pediatrics.
- Providing pediatric practitioners, residents, and medical students with essential biopsychosocial knowledge and clinical expertise.

PROGRAM PROFILE

MCHB currently funds twelve (12) programs with annual grant awards totaling approximately \$1,827,000. The next competition for developmental behavioral pediatrics grants is anticipated in FY 2023.



PROGRAM IMPACT

Trainees. In FY 2016, the MCHB DBP Training Program prepared 50 long-term trainees, 435 medium-term trainees, and 1,187 short-term trainees. Over 21% of long-term trainees are from underrepresented racial groups and over 11% are Hispanic/Latino.


Faculty. In FY 2016, 122 DBP faculty members from across the network mentored fellows using innovative clinical and didactic curricula to increase the pipeline of professionals ready to work with children with ASD/DD, and provided 570 continuing education events. Faculty, staff, and fellows successfully published 228 peer-reviewed journal articles and 722 other documents and presentations.

Interdisciplinary Care. In FY 2016, DBP programs conducted 10,915 diagnostic evaluations to confirm or rule-out ASD or other DD.

Title V. In FY 2016, all ten DBP training programs reported collaborating with State Title V (MCH) agencies or other MCH-related programs on nearly 400 activities in areas of service, training, continuing education, technical assistance, and product development.

DIVISION OF MCH WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT (DMCHWD)

DMCHWD, part of the Health Resources and Services Administration's Maternal and Child Health Bureau, provides national leadership and direction in educating and training our nation's current and future leaders in maternal and child health (MCH). The Division also provides leadership through state and community-based capacity building programs.

Special emphasis is placed on the development and implementation of interprofessional, family-centered, community-based and culturally competent systems of care across the entire life course.

DMCHWD supports programs established in federal legislation ([Title V of the Social Security Act](#), the [Autism CARES Act](#), and the [21st Century CURES Act](#)) to complement state and local health agency efforts. DMCHWD partners with state MCH programs, academic institutions, professional organizations, and other health training programs of the federal government to ensure that MCH workforce development programs are grounded in emerging and evidence-based practices.

In FY 2016, DMCHWD awarded 161 grants, an investment of approximately \$47 million.
